-  Community Gardens on City-Owned and Land Bank Properties



What is a community garden?

Community Gardens are a growing trend in the United States. They are defined as any piece of land that is gardened by a group of people. They can grow flowers, fruits and vegetables.

The City of Hutchinson defines a community garden as any collective group of at least three unrelated persons not residing in the same household coming together to create a garden. Groups that can often participate in community gardens are non-profit organizations and school groups, but neighbors and friends can pool together to develop a community garden as well.

Types of Community Gardens

- 🍅 Allotment Garden
Type of garden when the area is divided into smaller plots. Each smaller plot is gardened by an individual or family who belong to the larger organization.
- 🍅 Cooperative Garden
Type of garden managed through coordinated efforts by participating gardeners.
- 🍅 Youth Garden
Type of garden that specifically focuses on educating the youth.
- 🍅 Therapeutic Garden
Type of garden which focus on using horticulture as therapy to improve social, psychological and physical well-being of patients.

Getting Started

Community gardens take a lot of work. Three to five strongly committed individuals will be needed to ensure the success of your garden. Once you have identified your group, some action items include:

- 🍅 Choose a location
- 🍅 Evaluate what utilities are needed (without water, gardens won't typically grow)
- 🍅 Develop bylaws or rules (samples can be found in the 2015 Community Gardens Handbook)
- 🍅 Decide upon the garden type
- 🍅 Choose a name for your garden
- 🍅 Create a budget and identify how you will fund the expenses
- 🍅 Test the soil. Contact the Reno County Extension Office, (620) 662-2371, for information on soil testing.
